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Genesis Series #10: Wrestling for a Blessing

Genesis 32:22-32 (TNIV)

22 That night Jacob got up and took his two wives, his two female servants and his eleven sons and crossed the ford of the Jabbok. 23 After he had sent them across the stream, he sent over all his possessions. 24 So Jacob was left alone, and a man wrestled with him till daybreak. 25 When the man saw that he could not overpower him, he touched the socket of Jacob's hip so that his hip was wrenched as he wrestled with the man. 26 Then the man said, "Let me go, for it is daybreak." But Jacob replied, "I will not let you go unless you bless me." 27 The man asked him, "What is your name?" "Jacob," he answered. 28 Then the man said, "Your name will no longer be Jacob, but Israel, [a] because you have struggled with God and with human beings and have overcome." 29 Jacob said, "Please tell me your name." But he replied, "Why do you ask my name?" Then he blessed him there. 30 So Jacob called the place Peniel, [b] saying, "It is because I saw God face to face, and yet my life was spared." 31 The sun rose above him as he passed Peniel, [c] and he was limping because of his hip. 32 Therefore to this day the Israelites do not eat the tendon attached to the socket of the hip, because the socket of Jacob's hip was touched near the tendon. Genesis 32:28 Israel probably means he struggles with God.
 Genesis 32:30 Peniel means face of God.
 Genesis 32:31 Hebrew Penuel, a variant of Peniel

Mark 9:20-24 (TNIV)

20 So they brought him. When the spirit saw Jesus, it immediately threw the boy into a convulsion. He fell to the ground and rolled around, foaming at the mouth. 21 Jesus asked the boy's father, "How long has he been like this?" "From childhood," he answered. 22 "It has often thrown him into fire or water to kill him. But if you can do anything, take pity on us and help us." 23 " 'If you can'?" said Jesus. "Everything is possible for one who believes." 24 Immediately the boy's father exclaimed, "I do believe; help me overcome my unbelief!"

- Why might he change Jacob's name?
- What does the Angel do to Jacob?
- How do you think this experience shaped Jacob?
- Why do you think an angel of God wrestles with Jacob? Why does Jacob wrestle with him?
- Read the passage from Mark. What do you notice about the way Jesus interacts with the boy's father? What can you learn about Jesus from this interaction?
- What do you think Jesus means when he says "everything is possible"?
- What does belief have to do with Jesus?

- How are we to bring our doubts to Jesus?
- What doubts do you have about God that He might want you to deal with?
- How might we create space for each other's doubts, yet not stay there?

PRAY IT

• For belief to overcome our unbelief.
